The novelist appears to have drawn inspiration from social and digital media to craft the novel's vivid setting. Furthermore, fate, chance, or what may be termed the 'Immanent Will' plays a significant role in bringing together the novel's lovers, emphasizing the unpredictable and profound forces that shape human relationships.

Parallels with Twelfth Night

The novelist provides readers with background details about the major female characters, Savi and Sachi, revealing that they are residents of Greater Noida. Meanwhile, the key male characters, Manindra and Aryendra, are introduced as former students of Goenka Convent School in Ghaziabad. Aryendra, with hopes of marriage, sets out to meet Sachi, accompanied by Manindra, who earnestly requests to join him on this significant visit.

In *Twelfth Night*, Shakespeare explores the theme of love at first sight through several characters, most notably Olivia and Viola (disguised as Cesario). Olivia experiences an instant and overwhelming attraction to Cesario upon their first meeting, despite her initial vow to mourn her brother's death in solitude. Her sudden infatuation is illustrated when she says, "Even so quickly may one catch the plague?/Methinks I feel this youth's perfections" (1.5.-301-02). Likening love to a sudden, uncontrollable affliction. Similarly, Viola, in her guise as Cesario, develops feelings for Duke Orsino after their first encounter, creating a love triangle driven by immediate attraction. This portrayal of love highlights its irrational, impulsive nature, common in Shakespearean comedies, where love ignites quickly, often causing confusion and chaos.

He finds himself in a whirlwind of passion, but Savi gently asks him to be a bit more tender; although he's lost in the moment, her sighs and moans signal her need for gentleness. They share an intimate

connection for about twenty minutes before taking a brief pause. Their bond feels electric, and soon they reignite their passionate encounter. Let's have a look at this:

As they surrendered to their passion, their kisses grew more intense. Manindra's longing for this moment was palpable, and he reciprocated her fervour with equal ardour. The clash between Russia and Ukraine significantly disrupted the socio-economic, administrative, and communicative landscape. The novelist poignantly captures this in the lines, "No news, no tension. No Newspapers, no reactions. No freedom of speech, no criticism of Russian policy!" (31). Under the leadership of Zen-Sky, the Ukrainian president, the nation emphasized self-governance and self-administration, viewing these principles as symbols of their self-respect. However, Phu-tin, the Russian president, interpreted this stance as Zen-Sky's ego, prompting him to "teach a lesson" to the Ukrainian leader. This deepened the rift between the two countries, culminating in Russia's sudden attack on Ukrainian cities like Bucha.

Zen-Sky, determined to preserve Ukraine's autonomy, organized national programs in schools, colleges, and other institutions, instilling values of nationalism, heroism, liberty, and courage among the population. Despite Russia's attempts to pressure Ukraine into submission, the Ukrainian people, under Zen-Sky's leadership, rejected the idea of being subjected to Russian control. The values of "courage, zest, bravery, heroism, nationalism, and liberty were emphasized in particular," and Ukrainians were urged to remain free in spirit, resisting tyranny (32). Zen-Sky, rallying the nation with a powerful speech, declared, "Prestige once gone rarely returns," signaling his resolve to teach Russia a hard

lesson (32). As Russian forces quickly captured Bucha, Zen-Sky used rhetorical strategies to inspire his people, asking whether they preferred self-governance and respect or to be enslaved by Russia. This psychological and rhetorical dialogism proved highly motivating, leading Zen-Sky to launch a counterattack on the Russian Kremlin the following day.
